20th Century Violence is continuing with even more ferocity into the 21st

- 161,000 killed in Syria in the last three years
- 607,000 killed directly in Iraq.
- 1,030,000 million killed directly and indirectly in Iraq as a result of the war and rising
- 2,160 Palestinians killed in Gaza 2 months ago
- 1.5 million killed in the Congo
- South Sudan is on the verge of a new civil war that will be devastating in its consequences





The Incalculable

- How do we cost emotional and physical injury, loss, suffering, death, and grief?
- How do we cost persistent and transferred traumatic memories?
- How do we cost the loss of innocence?
- How do we cost emptiness, sorrow, desolation?
- How do we explain this violence?

Emotional and Material costs

- There are material costs of violence but we need to be mindful of the political economy of emotions which are never captured in cost benefit analysis.
- The psychological and emotional costs of violence persist through time and subvert peaceful and just possibilities.

Powerlessness and Violence

 "Peace is a competition between despair and hope, between disempowerment and committed persistence.
 To the degree that powerlessness takes root in people's consciousness, there is a greater tendency to resort to force. Powerlessness breeds violence".

 The whole point of terrorist politics is to precipitate an enemy over-reaction that will justify and widen the political and military struggle.




Civility and Barbarism

 The costs of direct violence are enormous. The costs of indirect violence are equally enormous.






Xenophobic Nationalism

Global Cost of Violence

Economic impact of violence in 2013 was estimated to be US\$9.8 trillion or 11.3% of Gross World Product

The Institute for Economics and Peace defines violence containment spending as economic activity that is related to the consequences or prevention of violence where the violence is directed against people or property.

Global Cost of Violence in 2013

- This amount is equivalent to around US\$1,350 per person
- Compared to estimates for 2012, it represents an increase of direct costs of US\$179 billion or a 3.8 percent rise in violence containment costs globally.
- The increase in the global economic impact of violence equates to 0.4 percent of global GDP.










Weapons Imports Change – (2008 – 2014)





The value of peace to the global economy

 Assuming the world could be 25% less violent, the total additional or redirected economic activity last year would equal an:

additional US\$2.45 trillion in 2014

- ✓ EU climate change programme €48B p.a.
- ✓ The entire cost of the United Nations US 5,152 B
- ✓ Repay Greece, Portugal and Ireland's debt US\$700B
- One trillion dollars remaining

The Challenge

- How do we the peoples of the world get our political leaders to realise that violence is costly in both material and human emotional terms and that lowering the cost of violence by 25% would liberate huge funds for positive peace?
- How do we generate a vision of a world where positive peace, social justice, and inclusion should guide all social, economic and political agendas and why are we going in the opposite direction?

Avoiding Extremism:Boosting Accountability: Building International Institutions

In the first place we need to ensure that our political leaders

- (i)Avoid extremism-nationalism, fascism, militarism, totalitarianism and dominatory cultures?
- (ii) Have higher levels of political accountability in relation to issues of war, peace and justice?
- (iii)Build and sustain international institutions capable of building and maintaining peace?

- Empathetic consciousness.
- Commitment to Social Justice and Equity.
- Value and Respect for Diversity.
- Concern for the Environment and commitment to sustainable development.
- Belief that people can make a difference-Love Courage and Hope

Overcoming the Politics of Fear

- In an interdependent world we can no longer afford to have narrow circles of compassion.
- We need to care for others whether they wish to harm us or not. We need to accord them dignity, and build our security in compassionate relationships-both at the interpersonal and trans national levels.
- Instead of basing our decisions on pessimistic scenarios and fear we need to to replace these with optimism and trust and seek our security cooperatively rather than than nationalistically.

Peace and Nonviolence are Imperatives not Optional Extras

- If we are to avoid the military carnage of the 20th century we have no alternative but to reiterate the central importance of peace and non violence as prerequisites for sustainable resilient and equitable development.
- We have to oppose domination wherever we see it at all levels-micro, macro, meso and meta.
- These are not optional extras but are critical to a more just and peaceful world.
- We need courage to take the first step towards removing violence we need courage for a new beginning.
